

# HKIE Transactions Standard Reference Style | Harvard Referencing

The Harvard Referencing Style, also called the “Author-date Referencing” or “Harvard Referencing System”, is a referencing style widely used for academic and scholarly referencing. All submissions to *HKIE Transactions* are required to use The Harvard Referencing Style in the in-text citation and reference list.

<b>In the text</b>	
<b>Citations for one author</b>	<p>The author's last name and the publishing year of the source should be placed in the parentheses after the text.</p> <p>Example: The length of the steps varies from 10 m to 100 m. The average length of steps at higher altitudes is 50 m and near the ground is about 10 m (Cooray, 2003).</p> <p>If the author's name already exists in the body of the text, then it should be excluded from the in-text citation. As a result, only the publishing year of the source should be cited.</p> <p>Example: According to the classical assumption made by Terzaghi, the rock load factors were estimated from a 5.5 m wide steel-arch which supported rail/road tunnel in the Alps during the late 1920s (1946).</p>
<b>Citations for two authors</b>	<p>When a source has two authors, include all authors' names in the order in which they appear in the source.</p> <p>Example: The model showed that the thrust capacity of the rock arch is simply determined by the ratio of unconfined compressive strength (UCS) to tensile strength with the provided bolt pressure (Bischoff and Smart, 1997).</p>
<b>Citations for three or more authors</b>	<p>Only use the first listed author's name in the in-text citation, followed by "et al." and the publishing year.</p> <p>Example: A world record of a 62 m span Norwegian Olympic Ice Hockey Cavern showed that the support pressures defined by Q-system may be more suitable to assess rock load acting on the tunnel/cavern roof, even for larger spanning underground openings (Barton et al., 1994).</p>

<p><b>Citations for more than one source</b></p>	<p>List out the citations according to the alphabetical order of authors' last name</p> <p>Example: ...(Chan et al., 2019; Cheng, 2018; Leung and Lau, 2005)</p>
<p><b>Citations for corporate authors</b></p>	<p>Use the name of the organisation in place of the author. If the name of the organisation has been mentioned in the text, include only the year in the parentheses.</p> <p>Example: The incident serves as a reminder of the possible insufficient drainage capacity of stepped channels designed in the early days when aerated flow was not being considered. (Geotechnical Engineering Office, 2006)</p>
<p><b>Citations for no author</b></p>	<p>When an author's name cannot be found, include the title of the source in italic in the parentheses, followed by the publishing year.</p> <p>Example: The success of a construction project relies not only on consultants and contractors but also on the joint effort from clients (or developers) (<i>TQM application by client organisations in Hong Kong</i>, 2018).</p> <p>If the title of the source could not be found, include the organisation of the source. For more details, please refer to the "Citations for Corporate Authors" above.</p>
<p><b>Citations with no date</b></p>	<p>When a date is not included in a source, use "no date" in the in-text citation.</p> <p>Example: Besides, overflow was observed from the 750 mm stepped channel above the failure location which was overwhelmed (<i>Importance of surface drainage management to slope performance</i>, no date).</p>
<p><b>Secondary sources (second-hand references)</b></p>	<p>Secondary references are used when an author refers to another author's work and the primary source is inaccessible. When citing secondary references, the author of the primary source</p>

	<p>and the author of the cited work should be included in the in-text citation.</p> <p>Example: According to Ng and Polycarpe (2017) as cited by Lee et al. (2018)...</p>
<b>Multiple works by the same author</b>	<p>If the sources are from the same authors and published in the same year, they should be differentiated by labelling “a”, “b”, “c” and so on directly after the publishing year.</p> <p>Example: ...(Botshekan, 2017a) ...(Botshekan, 2017b)</p>
<b>Personal communications</b>	<p>Information obtained by interview, telephone call, letter or email should be documented in the text, but should NOT be included in the list of References.</p> <p>Example: ...when interviewed on 15 June 2018, Dr San explained that...</p>

## Tables and diagrams

<b>Citation for images, tables and diagrams</b>	<p>Authors should provide in-text citations for any images, photographs, diagrams, tables or figures that they reproduce in their works. It is classified as direct quotes in which page numbers should be included. A full reference should follow in the reference list as any other type of work.</p> <p>Example: Figure illustrating the side-effect of debris flow (Li and Hu, 2017: p.21).</p>

<b>Order</b>	Citations are listed in alphabetical order by the author's last name. If there are multiple sources by the same author, then citations are listed in order by the date of publication.

<b>Printed for three or more authors</b>	<p>Names of all authors (Year published). Tracers of uplift and subsidence in the Cape Verde archipelago. <i>Journal of the Geological Society</i>, 167(3), pp. 519–538.</p>
<b>No author</b>	<p>Article title (Year published). <i>Journal title</i>, Volume (Issue), Page numbers (or URL if the article is retrieved online).</p> <p>Example:            Famine relief: Just a simple matter of supplying food (2002). <i>Nutrition Noteworthy</i>, 5(1). <b>Basic format</b>	<p>Author's last name followed by first initial (Year of publication). <i>Title of dissertation</i>. Academic level of the author. Official name of university or institution.</p> <p>Example: Bétournay M (1995). <i>The stability of shallow stopes of hard rock mines</i>. Ph.D. McGill University.</p>
<b>Online</b>	<p>Author's last name followed by first initial (Year of publication). <i>Title of dissertation</i>. Academic level of the author. Official name of university or institution, Available at: &lt;URL&gt;. [Accessed on Date Month Year].</p> <p>Example: Gregory S (1970). <i>English military intervention in the Dutch revolt</i>. <i>Unpublished work</i>	
<b>Personal manuscript</b>	<p>Personal manuscripts used in a work should be cited in the list of references. The year(s) during which the manuscript was produced should be shown instead of the year of publication. The title of the manuscript is shown in Roman type with minimal capitalisation and without quotation marks.</p> <p>The location of the manuscript is usually shown by the name of the person or organisation in possession and their city.</p> <p>Example: Arnold JP. <i>SERN 1120: POB Adelaide SA: POE Adelaide SA: NOK F</i>. Personal Record. Australia: National Archives of Australia, Available at: &lt;<a href="http://recordsearch.naa.gov.au/scripts/Imagine.asp?B=3023028">http://recordsearch.naa.gov.au/scripts/Imagine.asp?B=3023028</a>&gt;. [Accessed on 7 July 2013].</p>
<b>Unpublished thesis</b>	<p>A thesis used in a work should be shown in the list of references. The year in which the thesis was completed should be shown instead of the year of publication. The title of the thesis is shown in Roman type with minimal capitalisation and without quotation marks. The level of the thesis, for example, "PhD thesis", "MA thesis" should also be shown.</p>

<b>Unpublished conference, meeting, seminar paper or unpublished report</b>	<p>An unpublished conference, meeting or seminar paper used in a work should be cited in the list of references. The year in which the paper was presented should be shown instead of the year of publication. The title of the paper is shown in Roman type with minimal capitalisation and without quotation marks. The details of the conference, seminar or meeting should include the organisation under whose auspices the conference, seminar or meeting took place, its location and date(s).</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>King IW and Garshol MF (2012). <i>Rock reinforcement for underground</i>. <b>Letter or telephone call</b>	Personal communication such as conversations, letters, telephone calls, faxes should not be included in the reference list. All this referencing information should be given in the text with the citation.
eBook and PDF	
<b>Basic format</b>	<p>When citing eBooks and PDFs, include the edition, even if it's the first edition, and follow it with the type of resource in brackets (either [ebook] or [pdf]). Include the URL at the end of the citation with the date it was accessed in brackets. Use the following structure:</p> <p>Author's last name followed by first initial (Year published). <i>Title</i>. Edition. [format]. City: Publisher, page(s). Available at: &lt;URL&gt;. [Accessed on Day Month Year].</p> <p>Example:  Eckes T (2000). <i>The developmental social psychology of gender</i>. [ebook]. EBSCO Industries. Available at: &lt;<a href="http://www.netlibrary.com">http://www.netlibrary.com</a>&gt;. [Accessed on 5 February 2004].</p>
